
How do you respond to that...?

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

Aside from the four Turtles and their artistic namesakes, most people know very little about the Renaissance. It was a period of great rebirth and revival for both the arts and the sciences. Cities flourished and grew at alarming rates. When I lecture on the Renaissance in my Art History classes at Jackson College, and with the Michigan Department of Corrections Prison Education Initiative, I share with them what is happening in Detroit, specifically with the Heidelberg Project and Michigan Central Station.

When I saw editor Anthony Brancaleone's article, North America's First Modern Ruin (March 2014/15), I knew it had to be included in my class. It presents a start, a "what if?" to the discussion that is taking place about growth and rebirth in Detroit.

Recently, I asked my students to weigh in after reading the article and to offer their suggestions for what to do with this modern ruin. The responses from my prison students are often in stark contrast to those on main campus; where the students behind bars see no hope, the students on the outside see great potential. Thanks to Anthony for allowing me to use this in my class.

The following are responses and further ideas about what should be done with Michigan Central Station. In most cases the names of students have been changed:

A FUNCTIONAL RUIN

After reading the articles on the Michigan Central Station it really interested me and got me thinking. The history behind the Michigan Central Station and the amazing impact of transportation and importance it had amazed me. It's incredible how relevant the station was and the many "historical figures" who have used it. After the station had been left in ruins, there is so much possibility and potential to consider today.

Personally, I think that the station could be turned into something that both allows for a "functional ruin" as well as renovated into something interactive with the sense of the greater community. To make this happen, and for there to be no budget, the possibilities are really, truly endless.

I would turn the station into a both a museum and historic place, where people and families could come to view and learn about the past of it's use and the people who came through there. Tours could be available with views of the "functional ruins" and also renovations of what it was like before. Also in the station I would put a "dinner track", where people could buy tickets to go on the train and have a fancy dinner. Another addition I would make would be a concert/live music arena in the downstairs, where baggage and what not was formerly kept. There would be a bar as well downstairs. In other areas of the station, I think it would be neat to have small boutiques and shops, as well as restaurants and coffee

In conclusion, there is much potential for the Michigan Central Station. It is kind of sad to see something that was once so great fall to ruins, but there is also beauty in the ruins and what can become of that. It is really limitless

the things that the Station can become and be molded into, whether it falters, as far as from what it used to be, or be made almost identical to what it was. MICHIGAN STATE POLICE HEADQUARTERS





WEATHER FIX

Susan Goethel Campbell's 2010 video work, *Detroit Weather: 365 Days* was recently acquired by the Detroit Institute of Arts (DIA), and was on view from November to April. I saw the work a day before it closed, in a dimly-lit room nestled between the Rivera Court and Ancient Greece & Rome. At the time of the visit there was an unexpected soundtrack to the video in the form of the Sirius Quartet performance in the Riviera court.

Detroit Weather: 365 Days, writes the DIA, is a "two-channel video [which] comprises thousands of still images taken every minute, 24 hours a day, for one year, enabling the viewer to see how weather patterns come and go and move in all directions."

The three views that we get come from cameras installed on the 22nd floor of the Fisher Building, and we see Downtown, southwest Detroit, with the bridge, Rouge Plant and Marathon refinery, and east Detroit with the incinerator, the river and Lake St.Clair.

At any one time, the sped-up, ninety-minute video is shown in two of the three angles, each taking turns switching to the other part of town. Thankfully, the dates and times do not correspond in the two projections, so there are different weather patterns and times of day showing in each.

There is a weird enjoyment to be had from these types of works. The weather is usually an interesting topic and, after all, how often do we find ourselves making small talk in an elevator or at the counter by saying something about it? Weather is a common denominator, as it touches us all and affects across all other concerns. (There is even such a thing as an addiction to the Weather Channel). When sped up, weather footage can also have its magical and unsettling moments.

In Susan Campbell's work those moments include the unusually quick movement of celestial objects, the sudden directional changes in the paths of clouds, and the hasty arrival and departure of storms. At the same time, the video is as much about Detroit as it is about the atmosphere. All of the views are roughly half sky and half city, and the activity in the streets, shadows and smokestacks compete for our attention. Also, the occasional reflection of a computer screen inside the room housing the cameras serves as a welcome reminder that this is a working space. Caspar David Friedrich this is not—there are no Romantic notions of the tininess of humankind in the face of nature. The feel is more of raw data, so much so that I can't even recall having a single thought about global warming while watching the work, and that is a rare thing these days.

Detroit Weather is essentially nothing new in concept. The 1982 film Koyaanisqatsi comes to mind, with its sped-up views of everyday life, as well as the Weather Channel's days-long footage of snowstorms condensed into a minute. But the time-frame of the video is impressive, and the work reveals a genuine interest in meteorology. It also works well when exhibited next door to Rivera's murals, as it offers a contrasting image of the city.

This brings us to the last point, concerning the DIA: why not make it permanent? How about reworking the room into a black box and trying to project all three parts? A couple of curtains for soundproofing? Certainly, a world-class museum can do better.

Inner State Gallery and **Corktown Studios** were kind enough to host the two shows, but at the time of writing it is unclear where future exhibits will take place. This is a loss for southwest Detroit, and SW Solutions is to blame.


has largely gone unnoticed and is now at an end. The result is a loving tribute to the art and romance of the movies—and to the unseen people who brought the light to our screens.

Rock Steady Boxing, a unique exercise program based on training used by boxing professionals, and adapted to people with Parkinson's disease, is going strong at The Boxing Rink in Troy.

The program involves regular exercises, such as stretching, running, jumping rope, push-ups, and balancing exercises, as well as voice activation, cognitive thinking and fine motor skills strengtheners, along with lots of non-contact BOXING, led by experienced trainers and coaches. Rock Steady Boxing serves both men and women of all ages and levels of ability.

"We saw there was a need in the area with so many people suffering from Parkinson's disease," says Michael Martelli, professional boxing coach, CPT, Rock Steady certified coach, and owner of The Boxing Rink. "And worked quickly to bring this program to our area."

Martelli hired Carol Schram, the only RSB certified coach in the area at the time, whose husband suffers from Parkinson's Disease, and was personally affected by PD. Martelli then headed down to Indianapolis for certification.

Rock Steady Boxing, Inc., a non-profit organization, was founded in Indianapolis in 2006 with six participants. The Rock Steady Boxing Method was developed over the course of seven years. In 2012, the Training Camp was launched to help others with Parkinson's disease fight back — worldwide. Today, there are more than 80 Rock Steady Boxing affiliates in 27 states, as well as international affiliates in Australia and Canada, with more than 200 certified Rock Steady Boxing Coaches in the world, and growing every day. It is estimated that 1-1.5 million Americans have Parkinson's disease, with as many as an estimated 30,000 diagnosed in Michigan.

"We have always believed in the program," said Rock Steady Boxing, Inc. Executive Director Joyce Johnson. "When evidence began to emerge that our method had a very positive impact on the 'boxers,' our mission became clear — to share our knowledge and experience with all people with Parkinson's. That is why we decided to make our training available worldwide — to train as many as we can so together we can improve the care of people with Parkinson's everywhere."



To further enhance Rock Steady, The Boxing Rink has incorporated yoga as part of its membership. Deb Colling, CPT and head yoga instructor at The Boxing Rink and Deyoga Room has designed a class specifically for people battling Parkinson's Disease, "Deyoga Stretch for PD." Research proves regular stretching and certain postures can help increase motor function, mobility, balance, strength and more.

In the 2 months since the program has been up and running they have tripled their members, as well as tripled their classes, now offering 9 classes a week.

"We have become a family. We have comradery. Our boxers know they aren't in this alone, and they have support." Martelli says. "We come together, multiple times a week, every week, and sweat together, scream together, laugh together, grow together. It's really a priceless experience, and I am proud to be a part of it."

Grosse Pointe Yacht Club Named First Official Stadium

both live and virtual audiences. Each venue will draw its participating sailing organizations from a 120-mile radius.

"We are looking forward to hosting this inaugural event for the Midwest," said GPYC Commodore Thomas Lauzon. "The partnership with Premiere Sailing League USA will not only help promote the growth of youth sailing, but also serve as a symbol of the economic revitalization of our region."

Premiere Sailing League USA will divide the nation into four districts (North, East, South and West), with four venues selected to hold the District Qualification Regattas each year in the same major city of each region. The National Final will be held annually in a location that will rotate around the country. Each venue will be provided eight J/70s for racing in the Qualification Regattas. Supplied J/88s will be used for the District Qualification Regattas and National Final. At the conclusion of each season (August-November), the League will keep the eight J/70s active by allowing youth and race programs at each venue to utilize them.

As a long-time supporter of sailing on the Great Lakes, Wally Cross, President of Ullman Sails Midwest, is enthusiastic about the program. "This sailing league program will get kids involved big-time and help us grow sailing as a family and school activity in the region."

PSL USA will feature boat editions that are 100% made in the USA, starting with the design by J/Boats (Newport, R.I.); spars by Hall Spars & Rigging (Bristol, R.I.); hardware by HARKEN (Pewaukee, Wisc.); lines by New England Ropes (Fall River, Mass.); and hull and sail graphics by Mac Designs (Newport).

GPYC was founded in 1914 and is one of the country's premier yacht clubs; a prominently visible landmark located on Lake St. Clair, less than 30 miles from downtown Detroit.

DETROIT REMEMBERS: VERNORS 150 YEARS OLD

Next month, Detroit will be popping bottle caps all over town and pouring the bubbly. That's because Detroit's favorite non-alcoholic beverage, Vernors Ginger Ale, will be celebrating its 150th anniversary.

Many celebratory events are being held the week of June 5 through 11, 2016. The Vernors Ginger Ale Collector's Club informs us that various restaurants will be offering menus using

Vernors as a star ingredient. There will be an anniversary party at the Detroit Historical Museum. There will also be a poker run, in which participants receive a list of Vernors sites to visit in Detroit, and go to as many as they can.

Planned, too, is a Vernors history presentation and a screening of the documentary "Detroit Remembers When: Made in the Motor City."

James Vernor, founder of Vernors, served his first glass of Vernors Ginger Ale at the soda fountain in his pharmacy at 235 Woodward Avenue back in 1866.

In 1954, the City of Detroit asked Vernors to move from their Detroit Riverfront location, now Hart Plaza, to a location just north of the Whitney Restaurant along Woodward Avenue in Detroit's Midtown District. Vernors operated a bottling plant at that site until 1985. The plant was later demolished and replaced by an apartment complex, retail stores, and a parking deal.

LOUIS DAHL WOLFE

APERTURE'S REMARKABLE NEW MONOGRAPH on pioneering mid-century photographer Louise Dahl-Wolfe shines a light on one of the most influential but overlooked fashion photographers of the 20th century. Together with Diana Vreeland, Carmel Snow and Alexey Brodovitch, Dahl-Wolfe helped revitalize Harper's Bazaar in the 1930s, ushering in the magazine's golden age. Over 22 years there, she experimented with black-and-white, early color, natural light in outdoor settings and stories set in exotic locations-virtually creating the genre of modern fashion photography. Bazaar published more than 600 of her color photographs, 86 covers, and thousands of black-and-white photos. Her work influenced and was praised by all of the great photographers of her day, including Richard Avedon, Horst P. Horst and Irving Penn. And yet, until now, her work has been virtually forgotten. We highly recommend a second look.


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
